- Wexford announced lease with Brown for 31,000 SF at Point225 for laboratory use







Brown is going to use the 31,000 square feet it is leasing in the 196,000-square foot building at 225 Dyer St. to expand its medical and biotech research activity.

Planning Initiatives


- Completed parking study for east side of District

- Developed initial drawings and cost estimate for Pike Street/Alves Way connection and I-195 offramp realignment
- Started parking study for west side of District
- Launched resiliency planning
- Completed economic impact study for District











Community Engagement


- Held 10 community events outside of Commission meetings
- Pavilion architect interviews posted publicly and allowed public comment prior to architect selection
- Established new design review process to clarify process and provide more opportunities for public involvement
- Launched monthly newsletter and grew distribution to approximately 500 subscribers











Status of District Build Out, cont.

- More than 2.6 million SF and \$975 million of development completed, planned, or under construction
 - Projects reflect a mix of uses: lab, office, hospitality, and residential
 - 180 workforce and affordable units
 - Includes neighborhood amenities such as grocery store and childcare center
- 9 uncommitted parcels support 3.7 million SF of development; nearly double existing SF in Providence's downtown core
- Completed and under construction projects have generated a total economic output of over \$1 billion to date



Infrastructure Highlights

- Completed transformer screening project, which included planting 23 new trees
- Enhanced several planting beds throughout the park
- Installed shipping container for programming storage
- Installed permanent benches
- Purchased moveable furniture
- Worked with Steel Yard to design custom ADA picnic tables and installed on the east side
- Completed electrical upgrades to support Tizzy K's
- Began east side electrical upgrade project
- Riverwalk extension construction commenced











Park Pavilion

- Hired Architecture Research Office (ARO) and began designing pavilion
- Gave 9 public presentations on project including 4 interactive community events
- Approximately 30 individual meetings with stakeholders and small businesses
- RFP currently out for operator
- Groundbreaking anticipated for late 2023









Operations & Communications Highlights

- Grew park social media and newsletter following by over 100%
- Published monthly or biweekly newsletters throughout summer and fall
- Joined Downtown Providence Park Network board











Programming Highlights

- 90 total events, 152,391 attendance
 - 55 unique and free public events
 - Over 40 events featuring BIPOC and/or LQBTQIA+ artists or performers
 - Supported and featured 389 artists and performers
 - Formed 21 new programming relationships
- Hosted major community events such as: Design x RI Conference, RI Pride, and PVDFest
- Expanded program offerings to include film screenings, theatre and dance events, fitness classes, and children's programming
- Hosted two large-scale events for RISD










2022 Concessions

- Tizzy K's named Best Ice Cream in Providence
- Storefront container served over 22,000 patrons
- The Guild PVD Beer garden served approximately 31,000 patrons and produced 20 free public events
- Dune Brothers opened for 5th season with approximately 50,000 patrons











Call for Curators

- Created and executed the first "Call for Curators and Programming" mini-grant program
 - Prioritizes programming that is community-focused, free and open to the public
 - Funded 12 grants totaling \$74,000, supporting 37 events















Public Art

- Formed a partnership and long-term agreement with The Avenue Concept for public art on utility boxes
- Completed 6 utility box murals with unifying "Alewife" theme
- Commissioned Counterform Studio to create a mural on storage container
- Developed plans for the relocation of Mother and Child and the restoration and relocation of Head in the Clouds
