



The pavilion will contribute to framing important existing views on the city from within the park.

Site Constraints



Site constraints include estimated future water levels, an existing high pressure gas line running beneath the site, and preserved view corridors that run through the park to the river.

Activation of Plaza and Park Zones



The Park Pavilion will help provide permanent pedestrian scale program to the currently undefined western expanse of the park, while acting as a catalyst for attracting continued activity to the park's central plaza and adjacent green spaces, and preserving the north lawn for large scale events.

Park Pavilion - Pavilion Siting



The pavilion anchors the pedestrian plaza and forms a new destination within the western portion of the park.




Project Principles

- **Provide** amenities that support the park.
- Activate the plaza by providing a welcoming space to visit year-round.
- Orient the park experience by offering a central landmark for visitors within the park.
- Create a park hub that invites interaction between people and landscape.
- Compliment the Michael S. Van Leesten Memorial Bridge.

Park Pavilion - Proposed Concept Design




View of the pavilion's covered seating area from the north park lawn.

Site Plan



The pavilion is situated at the intersection of the Ship, Elbow, and Dorrance Street park pathways, anchoring the western edge of the park plaza.

Park Pavilion - Orientation




The building's facades and roof line orient towards the Michael S. Van Leesten Memorial Bridge to the east and the lawn immediately to the west.

Park Pavilion - Orientation



The building form is inflected to create exterior spaces beneath the perimeter canopy that face the North Lawn and the Ship Street Path.

Park Pavilion - Porous Edge



A porous edge of seating and landscape features surrounds the pavilion, providing a variety of pedestrian access points.

Park Pavilion Plan



The pavilion will house a food and beverage operator (primary and ancillary spaces), public restrooms, a park office, and kitchen and support spaces. The building will open up to the park to allow for flexible seating indoors and out. New paving, benches, and landscaping will ground the building in the park, offering a multitude of ways for people to access and interact with the building.

A timeless and durable material palette includes: cedar siding, aluminum storefront, aluminum shade trellis, textural ground cover, and planting at grade and atop the pavilion's green roof.

Park Pavilion - Foot of Pedestrian Bridge



The pavilion creates a backdrop to the west of the plaza, while its roof gestures to the park's north lawn and the Providence skyline.

Park Pavilion - Center of Plaza



A view from the plaza looking to the west.

Park Pavilion - North Lawn



Looking to the south from the northern lawn, the roof trellis creates a large shaded area at the east of the building. The ancillary food vendor orients to the north toward the Dorrance and Elbow Street paths.

Park Pavilion - Elbow Street Park Entrance



From the Elbow Street Path, visitors are drawn towards the building as the roof trellis frames views of the river and hill beyond.

Park Pavilion - Elbow Street Pathway



At the apex of the Elbow and Dorrance Street paths, the exterior seating area has expansive views of the north lawn, the bridge, and the city.

Park Pavilion - Ship Street Pathway



The building nestles into the park along the Ship Street path. Loose park seating peppers the western edge of the pavilion. The food and beverage area and its exterior seating are seen nearer the plaza.

Park Pavilion - Riverwalk Pathway



Standing at the foot of the new pedestrian bridge connecting the Riverwalk pathway to the Jewelry District to the south. The pavilion opens up towards the plaza and frames views of the Providence skyline.

Park Pavilion - Dorrance Street Pathway



The building and its exterior seating area define the edge of the Dorrance Street pathway.

Park Pavilion - View from North Lawn



From across the north lawn, the pavilion situates itself within the broader park landscape and the riverfront beyond.

Park Pavilion - Interior Facing Bridge, Facade Opened



The building has glazed and operable doors facing the plaza and the north lawn, enabling transparency, porosity, and framing expansive views to the city.

Park Pavilion - Exterior, Facade Opened



Low benches and planting will create a transition from the building to the park, helping to define exterior seating areas beneath the roof trellis.
